
I am working on some other fundraising events, day trips and will keep you all abreast of any upcoming activities we have planned over the summer.

Timothy John Neary

1947-2012

Long time council member Tim Neary passed away on April 25, 2012. Tim and his wife, Gayle Malone-Neary, are both life members of the Navy League and both served on the board of the Broward County Council. Tim also was very active in Broward Navy Days, VFW Post 2966 and the Chief Petty Officers Association of Miami.

Tim lived a life of service to his community and his country. He enlisted in the Navy in 1966 and in 1971 transferred from active duty to the Navy Reserves. He retired in 1992 as a Chief Petty Officer. Tim worked as a civilian employee of the United States Coast Guard ESU Miami for the past 12 years.

Tim requested cremation with burial at sea and a party. A celebration of his life will be held on Sunday, June 10, 2012 at Bravo Italiano Ristorante, 1515 SE 17th Street Causeway, Fort Lauderdale from 4:00 – 7:00 PM. Friends and family are encouraged to attend this event to lift a glass and share their memories of Tim. (Note that there will be bagpipes.)

COMMISSIONING



The commissioning of the second Sentinel Class Coast Guard ship, the USCGC RICHARD ETHERIDGE (WPC-1102), will take place on Friday, August 3rd at Port Everglades.

The 24-person crew assigned to the Richard Etheridge will conduct additional testing and evaluation prior to its commissioning. The cutter will be homeported in Miami and will primarily perform missions to save lives, enforce U.S. and international maritime law, and ensure security in the Coast Guard's 7th District off the Southeastern coast of the U.S. and in the Caribbean Sea.

All Fast Response Cutters delivered as part of the Sentinel-class are named after enlisted Coast Guard heroes. Richard Etheridge became the first African-American to command a life-saving station when the service appointed him as the keeper of the Pea Island Life-Saving Station in North Carolina in 1880. On October 11, 1896, Etheridge's rigorous training drills proved to be invaluable when the three-masted schooner, the E.S. Newman, was caught in a terrifying storm. The vessel was blown 100 miles off course and came ashore on the beach two miles south of the Pea Island station. Etheridge gathered his crew and they fought their way through the roaring breakers and finally reached the schooner. The Pea Island crewmembers journeyed through the perilous waters 10 times and finally rescued the entire crew of the E.S. Newman. For this rescue, the crew, including Etheridge, was awarded the Coast Guard's Gold Lifesaving Medal.
