Captain Patrick A. Lefere (shown with Council President George Reeves), Commanding Officer of Naval Air Station Key West, was the guest speaker at the dinner social held on May 12. He gave the audience a very interesting, and often entertaining, look at the past 100 years of naval aviation. Captain Lefere took the audience through these early years of naval aviation and then focused his presentation on the history surrounding Naval Air Station Key West. Although naval aviation started on November 14, 1910 when Eugene Ely, in a Curtiss Pusher, conducted a flight from the deck of the USS Birmingham, May 8, 1911 was designated as the birth date of naval aviation. On that date Captain Washington Chambers ordered two Curtiss biplanes for the Navy. The first naval flight ever made from Key West was on September 22, 1917 when a Curtiss N-9 seaplane was flown by Coast Guard Lt. Stanley Parker who went on to become the Station's first Commanding Officer. Today, the Air Station's supports operational and readiness requirements for Department of Defense, Department of Homeland Security, National Guard units, federal agencies, and allied forces. The Air Station is also host to many tenant commands.

# SEA SERVICE NEWS



Leadership from the multipurpose amphibious assault ship USS Bataan (LHD 5) embarked aboard the Italian carrier ITS Giuseppe Garibaldi (C 551) in early May to allow the two coalition partners to strengthen ties through shared experiences, ideas

The embark provided the opportunity for and insight. Capt. Steven Yoder, commander of amphibious squadron (PHIBRON) 6; Capt. Steve Koehler, commanding officer of Bataan; and Col. Eric Steidl, commanding officer of 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU), to discuss current operations and experience the daily routine of their Italian counterparts through a series of briefs at various stations around the Italian ship. Garibaldi and Bataan are both operating in the Mediterranean Sea, with Bataan conducting maritime security operations and providing support as required for coalition forces assigned to Operation Unified Protector. "It was an invaluable visit," said Koehler. "It allows us to gain a mutual understanding of our current operations and to forge relationships that will increase our navies' international interoperability. That's something we certainly want to build upon during our time in the Mediterranean. We look forward to returning the hospitality with a visit aboard Bataan."



The Marine Corps' shorttakeoff/vertical-landing (STOVL) F-35B Joint Strike Fighter has completed all of the vertical landings and about 80% of the short takeoffs required to begin testing aboard an amphibious assault ship later this year. The

F-35 Energy-Management diagrams, which display an aircraft's energy and maneuvering performance within its airspeed range and for different load factors, are similar to the F/A-18 but the F-35 offers better acceleration at certain points of the flight envelope. Beyond visual range, the aircraft's radar and stealthiness will enable it to dominate the skies. The Marine Corps has singled out the F-35 and the Amphibious Combat Vehicle, which replaced the recently canceled Expeditionary Fighting Vehicle effort, as its two most essential programs in the forthcoming budget crunch.



Military Sealift Command hospital ship USNS Comfort (T-AH 20) held several events to commemorate Nurses Week. Nurses Week is an internationally celebrated recognition event that was first observed in 1954, marking the 100th anni-

versary of Florence Nightingale's mission to Crimea. It begins each year May 6 and ends May 12, Nightingale's birthday.



The first Fast Response Cutter in the Sentinel Class will be the USCGC BERNARD C WEBBER, currently under construction in Louisiana. The cutter will be 153 feet, capable of 28 plus knots, with a crew of 22 guardians. The cutter is named for Petty Officer

First Class Bernie Webber who executed one of the most famous rescues in Coast Guard history. He piloted a lifeboat from Station Chatham Massachusetts to the stricken freighter Pendleton which split into two during a massive storm off of Cape Code on February 18, 1952. Fighting 70 knot winds, 50 foot seas and driving snow, Webber and his three crew members safely rescued 32 sailors. The cutter will be commissioned in Miami, probably at the end of the year. Broward County Council has been asked to assist with the commissioning ceremony; details will be forthcoming.



Members of Team Navy/ Coast Guard ascended upon Colorado Springs, Colorado to compete in the 2011 Warrior Games from May 16-21. The second annual Warrior Games took place at the Olympic Training Center and the U.S. Air Force Academy.

The team of 34 men and women shared a desire to win and a deep determination to compete. The warriors did not only train for themselves. They trained, they said, to give hope to other service members that have been seriously wounded, ill, or injured. The members of Team Navy/Coast Guard planned to excel in competition but they agree that the Games are about much more than medal counts. "I come out to the Warrior Games to show people what they can do," said Navy Petty Officer 1st Class Michael Dayton, a member of the sitting volleyball team. "The Warrior Games is the culminating event to our adaptive activities. It is a great program, because it allows us to focus on our possibilities and not our disabilities." Because of this spirit the word "wounded" has been purposely excluded from the title of the competition. The team is sponsored by Navy Safe Harbor, the Navy's lead organization for coordinating the non-medical care of wounded, ill, and injured Sailors, Coast Guardsmen, and their families. Through proactive leadership, Safe Harbor provides a lifetime of individually tailored assistance designed to optimize the success of enrollees' recovery, rehabilitation, and reintegration activities. 
