On August 3, 2012, Coast Guard cutter Richard Etheridge was commissioned in Port Everglades. The 154-foot Etheridge is the second Fast Response Cutter in its class of 18 Fast Response Cutters that are scheduled to be delivered to the 7th Coast Guard District over the next several years. The cutter will be homeported in Miami and will primarily perform missions to save lives, enforce U.S. and international maritime law, and ensure security in the Coast Guard's 7th District off the Southeastern coast of the U.S. and in the Caribbean Sea. The cutter has a 24person crew commanded by Lt. Cmdr. Christian Lee



(photo left).

The Etheridge is named after Richard Etheridge, a former slave who became the first African American to command a life-saving station. In 1896, he led a team of six in the daring rescue of 10 people from a schooner that had been grounded in a storm.

REMEMBERING



In June 2012, Cpl Taylor J. Baune, 21, was the 2,000th American service member killed in the Afghan War. Cpl Baune was assigned to the 1/7 Marines, which is one of the units that has been receiving the Council's and Weston Rotary Club's care packages.

The following is an excerpt of an article that appeared in the *Saint Paul Pioneer Press*.

Cpl. Taylor J. Baune, 21, was killed "while conducting combat operations in the Helmand province," according to a statement from the military. His wife, Colleen Baune, 20, said her husband was patrolling on foot when he was hit by a roadside bomb.

Taylor Baune became the 2,000th American to die in Operation Enduring Freedom. Baune was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 7th Marine Regiment, 1st Marine Division, I Marine Expeditionary Force and was based out of Twentynine Palms, California.

He deployed to Afghanistan on March 24, 22 days after he married his high-school sweetheart in Las Vegas. According to family, the corporal had planned to return to civilian life after he finished his tour in November or December. Baune is the 29th soldier from Minnesota to die in combat in Afghanistan. At least nine of the previous deaths also occurred in Helmand province.



IN MEMORIAM



A U.S. Navy honor guard paid tribute to the late actor Ernest Borgnine with a full-honors military sendoff at Forest Lawn Memorial-Park and Mortuaries cemetery in Hollywood, California on July 14, 2012. The honor guard honored Borgnine's lifetime of service and contributions to the Navy and its cause. After serving in the Navy for ten years, Borgnine left the service at the end of World War II as a Petty Officer 1st

Class. Ten years later, he won an academy award for his performance as the lead in "Marty." He went on to star as the title character in the hit '60s sitcom "McHale's Navy." In 2004, then-Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy Terry D. Scott awarded Borgnine with an honorary advancement to chief petty officer. "When Ernie was promoted to honorary chief ... there was never, of all the honors - even Ernie's academy award - never anything that meant as much to him," said retired U.S. Navy Capt. Kathi Dugan, one of Borgnine's closest friends. "He had tears in his eyes."

When Borgnine was making his final arrangements, requesting military honors at his funeral was definitely his idea, said Dugan. Borgnine thought so highly of the Navy that he asked in his will that attendants to his funeral donate to the Navy and Marine Corps Relief Society in lieu of bringing flowers.

REMEMBERING BILL KLING LONGTIME VETERANS ACTIVIST

William "Bill" Kling, a longtime and tireless activist on behalf of veterans' causes and the Democratic Party, died on August 6 at the age of 84. Mr. Kling, a native New Yorker, served in the Navy during World War II. He was best known for his community activism, especially on behalf of veterans. For 27 years, Mr. Kling was the head of the Broward County Veterans Council, which is the umbrella organization for all the veterans groups in the county. He also was a leader of the Jewish War Veterans.

Mr. Kling worked tireless to get the Broward County VA Outpatient Clinic build in Sunrise. He worked so hard on behalf of the building that there is a plaque inside the clinic's lobby that pays tribute to him. The Broward County VA Outpatient Clinic opened in October 2008 and replaced the Oakland Park VA Outpatient Clinic which had served veterans for more than 26 years. The outpatient clinic encompasses roughly 90,000 square feet of space and doubled the amount of space for primary care and sub-specialty care clinics. Mr. Kling was also instrumental in the opening of the Alexander "Sandy" Nininger Nursing Clinic in 2001 in Pembroke Pines and the South Florida National Cemetery in Palm Beach in 2007.

SEA SERVICE NEWS



Junior Sailors aboard our adopted ship USS Bataan (LHD 5) formed a new local chapter of the Navy's Coalition of Sailors Against Destructive Decisions (CSADD) in July. SADD is a Navy-wide program geared at young Sailors (ages 18 to

25) aimed at reinforcing a culture of shipmates helping shipmates, while preventing destructive behavior and building leadership skills. The program gives young Sailors the opportunity to help each other through peer-topeer interaction. CSADD helps Sailors with everything from making responsible drinking decisions to suicide prevention.



The Defense Department is conducting pilot classes of a new program designed to better prepare service members transitioning out of the military to civilian life. Transition Goals Plans Success, known simply as Transition

GPS, replaces the 20-year-old Transition Assistance Program, or TAP. In a sweeping overhaul of the 20-year-old TAP, as part of the VOW to Hire Heroes Act passed in 2011, Transition GPS takes military members through a week-long class, compared to the original TAP's mandatory two to four hours of separation counseling, said Susan Kelly, the Defense Department's deputy director for the newly formed Transition to Veterans Program Office. Naval Station Norfolk is one of seven installations now conducting pilot classes of the new five-day Transition GPS workshop. Full use of the program is expected to be in place by the end of 2013.



Coast Guard Cutters Richard Etheridge, Bernard C. Webber, and William Flores, the first three Sentinel Class Fast Response Cutters were together for the first time in Port Canaveral, seeking safe haven from

Tropical Storm Isaac on Sunday, August 26. Coast Guard Cutter William Flores sailed from Key West on August 24 to meet cutters Bernard C. Webber and Richard Etheridge in Miami. All three cutter's crews traveled together to Port Canaveral to seek safe harbor as the height of the storm passed through the Florida Keys and are now conducting post storm port inspections.



For Lance Cpl. Stephen Mader and his dog Maxx, riding in an armored truck over Afghanisan's rutted dirt roads is routine. Mader is an improvised explosive device detector dog handler

with 3rd Battalion, 8th Marines, Regimental Combat Team 6. Mader and Maxx have been together for seven months since they met at the 5-week IDD handler school in Southern Pines, SC. The dogs come to the school pretrained to obey commands and track explosive scents. Human students go to learn how to handle the dogs. Mader, who joined the Marine Corps in 2009, said the dog needs a good rapport with their handler. If there is a personality clash, the dog won't perform. Unlike some military working dogs, IDDs are not trained to be aggressive. Because of this, IDD handlers have the discretion to allow other Marines to approach or pet their dogs. Maxx is popular with the Marines and gets a lot of attention. But, when it comes time to work, he's ready to go. As the Afchan National Army continues to take over more of the security responsibilities in Helmand province, officials at Marine Corps Systems Command said they anticipate the number of dogs currently serving to be reduced in the near future, correlating with the reduction in Marine forces in the region. If Maxx is no longer needed, Mader said he wants to adopt him.



The U.S. Coast Guard has selected SAFE Boats International LLC of Port Orchard, Washington, to provide future Over-The-Horizon IV (OTH-IV) cutter boats. The selection was made after conducting a "boat off" with three

different builders. The "boat off" included testing conducted at the U.S. Navy's Combatant Craft Division in Norfolk, Virginia, and with the Coast Guard Cutter Bertholf in San Diego, California. SAFE Boats International was selected as offering the best value to the government. The contract is for up to 101 boats over a seven year period with a contract ceiling of \$58.9 million. The Coast Guard may order up to 71 boats to be deployed aboard the service's major cutters, including the National Security Cutter class. The contract also includes up to 10 boats for the U. S. Navy and up to 20 boats for Customs and Border Protection.

FUTURE MILITARY

Our Community Salutes of Miami-Dade County held a ceremony at Jungle Island on June 2, 2012 to honor and support the high school graduates, families and mentors of future service members as they embarked on their careers in the military. Brig. Gen. Hector Pagan, the former head of Special Operations Command South based in Homestead, addressed the young recruits and their families on the expectations and challenges ahead. Superintendent of Schools Alberto Carvalho was the civilian keynote speaker. Vice Admiral Joseph D. Kernan of the U.S. Navy, led 87 future Army soldiers, 95 future Marines, 21 future airmen and 84 future Navy sailors in the oath of service.

The event was arranged by Council member Raul Mas who acted as Master of Ceremonies and included representatives from all services. Lunch was served to the enlistees and families. Council members Mary Anne Gray, Peter Caspari and George Reeves attended.
