FLIGHT 19 CEREMONY

Each year it's a solemn ceremony - military and aviation officials ring a bell 14 times, once for every crew member lost on Flight 19, a squadron of five Navy torpedo bombers that took off from Fort Lauderdale on December 5, 1945, never to return.

Flight 19, also known as the Lost Patrol, took off on a routine navigational exercise shortly after the war ended. About 90 minutes into the mission, flight leader Lt. Charles Taylor radioed that he was lost, his compasses malfunctioning. Meanwhile night and stormy weather set in. Experts think the five single-engine TBM Avengers ran out of fuel and ditched in the Atlantic east of Daytona Beach. Another 13 servicemen perished when their search plane crashed. Because the planes have never been found, the Lost Patrol remains one of aviation's great mysteries and popularized the myth of the Bermuda Triangle.

Cmdr Dennis J. Volpe, commanding officer of the USS Taylor and 30 crew members including the Executive Officer and Command Master Chief attended this year's event which was held at the Naval Air Station Museum. Cmdr Volpe addressed the audience and Boatswains Mate Second Glass Justin Plank (shown in photo below) had the honor of ringing the memorial bell.

BROWARD VA CLINIC



In December, the House approved a bill to rename the Broward Veterans Affairs Outpatient health clinic on Commercial Boulevard in Sunrise the William 'Bill' Kling VA Clinic, in honor of the long-

time leader and advocate for military veterans in South Florida. Congresswoman Debbie Wasserman Schultz, a Weston Democrat, introduced the bill, backed by fellow members from Florida.

Bill Kling was a tireless veteran activist and fierce advocate for veterans. For 8 years, he served on the Florida Commission on Veterans' Affairs, and for the past 27 years, he was the president of the Broward County Veterans Council. In 2008, the new 98,000-square-foot clinic opened in Sunrise, much to his credit. Bill Kling passed away in August at the age of 84.

IN MEMORIAM



The Council lost a long-time member and great supporter on December 4, 2012. Henry "Hank" Petri passed away of heart disease at the age of 91. The following is an excerpt from the obituary which appeared in the Sun Sentinel.

Born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, he understood at a young age that he desired more. Influenced by his maternal grandfather, he had the adventuresome gene. He enlisted in

the Marines hoping to fly but ended up in the South Pacific during WW II. What he realized, among other things, from this experience, is that he wanted to live in a warm, tropical climate. Eventually, with his wife, Ruth, and two young daughters, Hank moved to Miami in December 1950. Hank had secured a job as a pest control routeman with Truly Nolen. He was excellent at his job because, among other talents, he had people skills. So, he took the risk and went into his own business forming Petri's Positive Pest Control in 1956. He was an active member of his church, his community and several business clubs and organizations but, most importantly, he had the love and support of his wife, Ruth, whom he acknowledged to be his best asset. He served as President of the Florida Pest Control Association and was active in the Associated Pest Control Association. In 1962, Hank moved north to Pompano Beach realizing his dream of living on the water and near an airport. He had taken flying lessons while living in Miami and eventually owned his own plane, which he flew frequently. He became active in civic organizations in Pompano and in Broward County. In addition, he became a member of the Navy League rising to regional vice president. This involvement led to another love he always had and that was for travel, especially to adventurous, exotic places. He eventually traveled to all seven continents. He was a self-educated, extremely well read man who had more facts stored in his brain than most and, as a former boy scout, had real life experience in survival and was a lover of nature. His caregiver, Bob, commented recently that the year and a half he had spent getting to know "Papa" was one of the most extraordinary learning and wisdom gathering experiences of his life.

Hank will be truly missed by his Navy League family.

SEA SERVICE NEWS



The U.S. Merchant Marine Academy named Captain (ret.) Susan L. Dunlap as its new deputy superintendent. Dunlap, a 28-year Navy veteran, will begin work at the Academy in January. Captain Dunlap most recently served as U.S. Naval Forces Africa, Director Africa Engagement Group, where she provided direct oversight of all maritime theater security cooperation with Africa, including

the internationally-recognized Africa Partnership Station (APS) program. Earlier in her career, Captain Dunlap led the Military Sealift Command, Far East, which operated an average of 48 ships that replenish fuel and supplies to U.S. Navy forces. She also commanded the only assault craft unit in the Pacific Fleet, which was tasked with operating, maintaining and providing assault craft for ship to shore movement during and after an amphibious assault.



Rick Governor Scott's Base Commanders Meetina was held at Coast **Guard Air Station** Miami on December 14. 2012. This quarterly meeting is held to ensure

state leadership is aware of current initiatives and issues facing state agencies and military base commanders.



In mid-December, Marines and Sailors with the 24th Marine Expeditionary Unit offloaded from the ships of the Iwo Jima Amphibious Ready Group and returned to homecomings in and around Camp Lejeune, North Carolina, after a ninemonth deployment. The 24th MEU made the ship-to-shore transit from the USS Iwo Jima. USS New York and USS Gunston Hall using amphibious assault vehicles. Navv hovercraft. aircraft which included MV-22B Osprevs and CH-53E Super

Stallion helicopters, and the Morehead City Port facility. The 24th MEU departed the coast of North Carolina last March and spent the rest of the year sailing around the U.S. Navy's 5th and 6th Fleet areas of responsibility as an expeditionary crisis response force. The MEU/ARG team maintained continuous presence and a robust alert status as America's 9-1-1 force throughout U.S. Central, European and Africa Commands, conducting significant training operations in Morocco, Jordan, Kuwait and Djibouti, Africa.



Sailors aboard guided-missile destroyer USS Jason Dunham (DDG 109) concluded their participation in a two-week sleep study on December 17. The study was conducted by personnel from the Na-

val Postgraduate School (NPS) who came aboard Jason Dunham to interview crewmembers about their watch rotations and monitor their sleep patterns, activity periods and reaction times. At the beginning of the study, Sailors met with the NPS personnel, who issued wrist activity monitors and smart phones to track Sailors' reaction times by having them perform physical and mental tasks. The study showed in favor of a watch rotation with three hours on and nine hours off, but Sailors had mixed reactions. The study is being sponsored by the Office of Naval Research and the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. The findings are scheduled to be published in an upcoming issue of Proceedings magazine. The Navy will use the results to provide guidance to commanding officers around the fleet. Jason Dunham is deployed with the John C. Stennis Carrier Strike Group to the U.S. 5th Fleet Area of Responsibility conducting maritime security operations, theater security cooperation efforts and support missions for Operation Enduring Freedom.



Beneath the blue waters of the Florida Keys, the continental United States' only living-coral barrier reef stretches for miles. The reef and surrounding waters generate more than \$2.3 billion annually

for the local economy, create more than 33,000 ocean jobs throughout the Florida Keys and support fisheries that feeds millions. Across this economically important area, the Coast Guard maintains 450 buoys, markers and aids to navigation that safely guides water traffic through the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary, stretching 2,900 nautical miles from the Dry Tortugas National Park to Fowey Rock near Miami. The Maritime Security Response Team's Regional Diver Locker East supports this mission with their specialized training and capabilities. The MSRT, like most Coast Guard units, is multi-mission and scalable. In addition to its primary homeland security mission, the team deploys divers to provide aids to navigation, search and recovery and ship's husbandry support to Coast Guard units throughout the country. The comprehensive and coordinated approach to the management of the aids and coral inside the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary demonstrates the Coast Guard's commitment to maintaining America's maritime resources
