THE STAR CENTER

For those who may not be familiar with the STAR Center, the following information was taken from their website (www.star-center.com).

STAR Center is a not-for-profit maritime training school that is the top choice of inland and ocean-going professional mariners throughout the world. Opening in 1983 in Toledo, Ohio, we expanded to our current location in Dania Beach, Florida (just south of Fort Lauderdale) in 1986, consolidating all training there in October 2008. After extensive facility improvements, we opened for business with the world's first 360° field-of-view Full Mission bridge simulator, and a second 247° (subsequently upgraded to 270°) field of view bridge simulator, in 1993. We now offer more U.S. Coast Guard and other approved courses than any other simulation training center. Our courses meet USCG, STCW, and IMO Model requirements, as well as many additional courses designed by our in-house curriculum development team to meet company-specific training requirements.

STAR Center features the most advanced simulation training equipment including:

- 1. A 360° Full Mission bridge
- 2. A 270° Full Mission bridge

3. Dynamic Positioning simulators, Nautical Institute approved.

- 4. A Slow Speed Diesel engine room simulator
- 5. The world's first Full Mission Diesel Electric simulator
- 6. Kongsberg "Neptune" Liquid Cargo simulator
- 7. MPRI (L3) LNG Simulator
- 8. Radar/ARPA simulators
- 9. Transas ECDIS and Poseidon GMDSS simulators

STAR Center also features in-house modeling capabilities for port development, ship response models, research, and forensic maritime studies.

OUTSTANDING COUNCIL

Council Performance Awards are presented annually at the Navy League's National Convention. Recipients are selected by an Awards Committee appointed by the National President after they review the annual report which must be submitted by each Council President. The annual report outlines the Council's activities including support of the sea services, sea service families, and our youth. Activities related to legislative affairs and community involvement are also included in the report. The Awards Committee determines whether a Council's activities deserve an outstanding, meritorious or honorable mention award based on the degree to which the Council meets criteria outlined in the Navy League Operations Manual.

The Broward County Council was recently informed that it has been rated Outstanding for 2013. The award will be presented in San Diego at the National Convention, which is being held June 24–June 29. Other Florida Councils who will be recognized as Outstanding Councils are Key West, Mayport, St. Augustine and Tampa. Daytona Beach will receive a Meritorious Council award.

JROTC AWARDS

The Navy League has established a Youth Medal that is awarded to outstanding Navy and Marine Corps Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (JROTC) cadets and Naval Sea Cadets. The award consists of a medal, ribbon bar, certificate, and pamphlet on President Theodore Roosevelt whose visage is on the medal. Each year, the Council presents this medal (better known as the Teddy Roosevelt medal) to outstanding cadets at each of the schools the Council sponsors. The outstanding cadet is chosen by the commander of their JROTC unit.

LEGION OF HONOR

Twenty-two World War II veterans who fought alongside French forces received special recognition by the French Government at a ceremony held on the flight deck of the USS New York during Fleet Week.

US veterans who risked their life during World War II to fight on French territory and who are warded this distinction are appointed to the rank of Knight of the

Legion of Honor. Created to honor extraordinary contributions to the country, the Legion of Honor is France's highest distinction. To be eligible to this outstanding award, the veteran has to fit strict criteria including having fought in at least one of the 3 main campaigns of the Liberation of France: Normandy, Provence/Southern France or Northern France. Since only a small number of Legion of Honor medals are awarded each year in the United States, care is taken to award only those with the most distinguished records; veterans must have received such decorations as the Bronze Star, Distinguished Flying Cross, Purple Heart, and Silver Star.

SEA SERVICE NEWS



The U.S. Coast Guard and the Nigerian Navv held a ceremony May 7 in on North Charleston to officially sign the decommissioned Coast Guard Cutter Gallatin over to

the Nigerian Navy. The Gallatin was offered to Nigeria through the Foreign Assistance Act (FSA) and was decommissioned from Coast Guard service on March 31, 2014. The FSA allows the transfer of excess defense articles as a grant to friendly foreign governments under the auspices of the State Department. During the ceremony, Coast Guard Chief Acquisition Officer Rear Adm. Bruce Baffer and Nigerian Minister of State for Defence Musiliu Obanikoro signed transfer documents in front of U.S. and Nigerian spectators, marking the official handoff of the ship to Nigeria. Baffer said the transfer was bittersweet but said he believes the ship, renamed NNS Okpabana, will provide valuable service to Nigeria. Obanikoro said the ship will strengthen Nigeria's capabilities to safequard the country's waters and offshore resources and thanked America for support provided to his nation.



The White House recently announced that William "Kyle" Carpenter would become the eighth living veteran of U.S. combat in Iraq and Afghanistan to receive the Medal of Honor, the nation's highest military award. The cere-

mony will be held on June 19. Carpenter was wounded in Helmand province, Afghanistan, on November 21, 2010, while serving as a machine gunner. Carpenter and another Marine were manning a rooftop position during a firefight with Taliban insurgents when a hand grenade landed nearby. Carpenter rushed toward the grenade and his body took most of the blast; he lost most of his jaw and an eye. The other Marine, Lance Cpl. Nicholas Eufrazio, also was injured. Carpenter said he had to be revived while being evacuated by helicopter from the battle and was labeled dead on arrival at a field hospital. He later nearly died again at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Carpenter, medically retired from the Marine Corps last year as a corporal, is now a student at the University of South Carolina in Columbia.

Bataan Amphibious Ready Group (ARG) and embarked 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit are participating in exercise Eager Lion 2014, which is a multinational exercise designed to strengthen military-to-military relationships and enhance security and stability in the region by responding to modern-day security scenarios.



The Coast Guard welcomed the newest fast response cutter to the fleet on May 10 as Coast Guard Cutter Kathleen Moore was commissioned in Key West. The cutter is named after Coast Guard heroine Kathleen "Kate"

Moore, keeper of the Black Rock Harbor Light on Fayerweather Island, a small seaside community south of Bridgeport, Connecticut. Moore served for 72 years and is officially credited with saving 21 lives. She retired from service in 1878 at the age of 84. Photo shows Lt. Established during the Civil War as a burial ground for Union soldiers, Arlington National Cemetery has taken in the remains of more than 400,000 Americans. More

than 4 million people visit the cemetery annually. Through June, the cemetery will host a series of events to commemorate Arlington's 150 years as a national cemetery. There are nearly 5,000 unknown soldiers buried at Arlington National Cemetery. The "Tomb of the Unknowns" has never been officially named and is guarded 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The cemetery will host lectures and tours that highlight the history of the United States through the eyes of the heroes buried at Arlington and the military conflicts that shaped the cemetery and the nation.
