I had the honor of escorting Dr. Michael Lazzopina from Davie, who served as an Army Medic during World War II, then attended medical school and returned to active duty as a Navy doctor for two years during the Korean War to take care of Navy and Marine Corps members in North Carolina. I encourage all of our members to get involved with that organization as they honor those who served our country during World War II.

It's also that time again to start planning for Fleet Week 2017, coming to Port Everglades from May 1 -May 7, 2017. The initial planning meeting will be held on Wednesday, January 18, 2017, in the Port Everglades Auditorium. The US Navy is planning to send more ships our way this year, along with the US Coast Guard and a Royal Canadian Navy ship. DECEMBER GUEST SPEAKER

Commander, U.S. Marines Corps Forces, South Brigadier General Kevin Iiams



Brigadier General Kevin Iiams assumed command of U.S. Marine Corps Forces, South on January 7, 2016 where, as the Marine service component commander, he is responsible to the Commander U.S. Southern Command for all Marine activities across Central and South America and the Caribbean. He was born in New Orleans, LA and graduated from the U.S Naval Academy in 1986. He was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant in the U.S. Marine Corps and upon completion of flight school was assigned to fly the FA-18 Hornet.

Brigadier General Iiams' Command tours include Marine All Weather Fighter Attack Squadron 242 "The Bats" from 2003 to 2005, where he deployed to Iraq for Operation IRAQI FREEDOM II. During this deployment the squadron produced a record setting 3800 combat sorties and 8300 combat hours in just 9 months while in support of the battle of Fallujah and other operations in Iraq. Upon return from combat operations, his squadron was recognized by the MCAA as the Marine Fighter Attack Squadron of the year. From 2009 to 2011 Brigadier General Iiams commanded Marine Aircraft Group 41 in Fort Worth, Texas and sustained multiple unit deployments in support of global commitments. From 2014 to 2015 he was the Assistant Wing Commander, 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing in Camp Pendleton, CA.

BGen Iiams' other operational tours in the FA-18 include VMFA-451, "The Warlords" 1990-1992, VMFA-235 "The Death Angels" 1993-1996, and VMFA-232 "The Red Devils" 2000-2002; where he participated in combat during Operations DESERT SHIELD/ DESERT STORM and NOBLE EAGLE and supported contingency operations during multiple WESTPAC deployments. Brigadier General Iiams' staff and joint assignments were as a Forward Air Controller (FAC) Instructor, FA-18 Tactics Instructor and Adversary Pilot at Marine Aviation Weapons and Tactics Squadron-1 from 1996 to 1999 and Operations Officer for Marine Aircraft Group 11 supporting Operations SOUTHERN WATCH and IRAQI FREEDOM from 2002 to 2003. From 2006 to 2009 he served at USCENTCOM as the Battlestaff Exercise Branch Chief, Chief of Operations for the Joint Operations Center, and Director J7 Training and Exercises. From 2011 to 2012, he served as the 2d Marine Aircraft Wing Standards Officer, and deployed to Afghanistan as the Assistant Wing Commander for 2d MAW (FWD) HQ for Operation ENDURING FREEDOM 13. In June 2013 he was assigned as Deputy Director for Operations in the National Military Command Center, J3, Joint Staff.

Brigadier General Iiams attended and graduated from Amphibious Warfare School in 1993; the Weapons and Tactics Instructor course in 1995; the Air Force Air Command and Staff College in 2000; the US Army War College in 2006; and the Armed Forces Staff College in 2009. He was designated a Joint Qualified Officer in 2009. He holds a Bachelor's degree in General Engineering (Space Systems) and Master's degrees in Military Arts and Science and Strategic Studies.

Brigadier General Iiams has over 3800 hours in tactical aircraft, and has flown over 500 combat hours on over 270 combat missions. His personal decorations include: The Defense Superior Service Medal with Bronze Oak Leaf Cluster; The Legion of Merit; The Bronze Star with Gold Star; The Meritorious Service Medal; The Air Medal with Gold Star, Combat "V", and 18 Strike Flight Awards; The Navy Marine Corps Commendation Medal with 2 Gold Stars and Combat "V"; and The Navy Marine Corps Achievement Medal.

ADOPTION

The Council is pleased to announce that we have submitted the official paperwork to adopt the US Coast Guard Cutter Margaret Norvell, homeported in Miami. As one of our adopted units, the Council will honor its sailors and provide financial support to its MWR fund. Commanding Officer LT Brittany Panetta has expressed an interest in partnering with the Council on future events.

The fast response cutter Coast Guard Cutter Margaret Norvell was commissioned in New Orleans in June 2013. The cutter is the first in its class to be named after a Coast Guard heroine - Margaret "Madge" Norvell. Norvell, a member of the U.S. Lighthouse Service, first served at the Head of Passes Light as an assistant keeper from 1891 to 1896. She was credited for numerous rescues during her time as keeper, maintaining a vigilant watch at the entrance of the Mississippi River. Her bravery as she pulled in shipwrecked sailors did not go unnoticed and she was soon appointed keeper of both Port Pontchartrain Light and West End Light. In the end, Norvell stood the watch for 41 years with the U.S. Lighthouse Service.

Commanding Officer Lieutenant Brittany Panetta is a 2009 graduate of the Coast Guard Academy, where she earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Management. LT Panetta has served onboard the USCGC VIGILANT (WMEC 617) and the USCGC NANTUCK-ET (WPB 1316). She also served as the Assistant Coast Guard Liaison Officer for the United States House of Representatives in Washington DC. She is a native of Miami and is married to Major Joseph Panetta, U.S. Army.



DECEMBER EVENTS

On Sunday, December 4, Broward Navy Days will host the 75th commemoration of the attack on Pearl Har-The event takes place at 2:00 PM at Coast bor. Guard Station Fort Lauderdale. As the number of survivors continues to dwindle, Broward Navy Days is dedicated to preserving the memory of the infamous attack that catapulted the United States into World War II. On December 7, 1941, the American Army and Navy base in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii was attacked by the Imperial Japanese Navy. The attack came as a surprise and lead to great losses of life and equipment. More than 2,000 American citizens were killed and more than 1,000 were injured. The Americans also lost a large proportion of their battle ships and nearly 200 aircraft that were stationed in the Pacific region. More than 60 Japanese servicemen were killed, injured or captured. The Japanese Navy also lost five midget submarines and 29 aircraft. The Japanese military had hoped that the attack on Pearl Harbor would prevent the United States from increasing her influence in the Pacific. However, the events in Pearl Harbor actually led to the escalation of World War II. The day after the attack, the United States declared war on Japan and so entered World War II.

On Monday, December 5, Naval Air Station Museum (NAS) Fort Lauderdale will host the 71st anniversary Flight 19 memorial ceremony. The event takes place at 1:00 PM at the Museum Building located at 4000 West Perimeter Road in Fort Lauderdale. Flight 19 is one of the great aviation mysteries and gave birth to the legend of the Bermuda Triangle. The Memorial Ceremony commemorates 14 crewmen from the 5 TBM Avenger airplanes and 13 crewmen from the Mariner rescue seaplane who all vanished on December 5, 1945. The ceremony is a public event held on the grounds of NAS Fort Lauderdale which is on the National Register of Historic Places and a Florida Heritage Site.

VETERANS

Broward County recently decided to provide door-todoor transportation for veterans visiting the William "Bill" Kling VA Clinic through their program called TOPS! (Transportation Options). Veterans will need to register for the program and will get a personal ID number. Utilizing a toll-free phone number, they will be able to make reservations for their travel. Support of visiting military vessels: Council greets each visiting military vessel and hosts All Hands Parties for the crews. Ship tours and onboard receptions are arranged when possible.

Dinner Socials: Council provides guest speakers who will share information on issues affecting the Sea Services. This is a great opportunity to interact with other Navy Leaguers and military personnel.



SEA SERVICE NEWS



Known more professionally for his work involving the eradication of fruit flies, Dr. Ernest James Harris, Jr. received the highest civilian award in the United

States for his contributions as a Marine. U.S. Marine Brig. Gen. Brian W. Cavanaugh, deputy commander, U.S. Marine Corps Forces, Pacific, presented Dr. Harris with his Congressional Gold Medal at Washington Place in Honolulu on November 12. In 2011, President Barack Obama signed into law the legislation to award the Congressional Gold Medal to the Montford Point Marines. This award recognizes Montford Point Marines' contributions to the Marine Corps and the United States of America from 1942 to 1949, during a time of hardship and segregation. The opportunity for African-Americans to enlist in the Marine Corps came in 1941. A year later, they began their training at Camp Montford Point, North Carolina, during a time and place where racism and segregation were a part of everyday life. Despite segregation of the Montford Point Marines, they had excellent performance during Peleliu, Iwo Jima, the Chosen Reservoir, and in Vietnam.



In early November, the Coast Guard offloaded approximately 350 kilograms of seized cocaine from the Coast Guard Cutter Richard Etheridge at Coast Guard Base Miami Beach.

During an Operation patrol on October 27, a Joint Interagency Task Force South marine patrol aircraft detected a go-fast vessel suspected of smuggling contraband in the Caribbean Sea. The Royal Fleet Auxiliary Wave Knight and an embarked Coast Guard Law Enforcement Detachment diverted to intercept the vessel. The RFA Wave Knight crew launched a helicopter and a smallboat with a Coast Guard LEDET aboard and boarded the go-fast, detained five suspected smugglers and seized 14 bales of contraband, which later tested positive for cocaine. The contraband and suspected smugglers were turned over to federal law enforcement officials in Miami. The drugs have an estimated wholesale value of \$11.6 million. The Coast Guard Cutter Richard Etheridge is a 154-foot fast response cutter homeported in Miami. The RFA Wave Knight is a 645-foot fast fleet tanker of the United Kingdom.



On November 9, Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus announced that the Arleigh Burke-class destroyer, DDG 121, will be named Frank E. Petersen Jr., in honor of the Marine Corps lieutenant general who was the first African-American Marine Corps aviator and the first African -American Marine Corps general officer. In 1950, two years after President Harry S. Truman desegregated the armed forces, Petersen enlisted in the Navy. In 1952,

Petersen was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps. He would go on to fly 350 combat missions during the Korean and Vietnam Wars. He also went on to become the first African-American in the Marine Corps to command a fighter squadron, an air group and a major base. Petersen retired from the Marine Corps in 1988 after 38 years of service. At the time of his retirement he was, by date of designation, the senior-ranking aviator in the Marine Corps and the United States Navy. Petersen died last year at his home in Stevensville, Maryland, at the age of 83.



On November 22, Rear Ad-Grace miral Hopper (posthumous) was one of 21 recipients of the Presidential Medal of Freedom. The Presidential Medal of Freedom is the Nation's highest civilian honor, presented to individuals who have made especially meritorious contributions to the security or national interests of the United States, to world peace, or to cultural or

other significant public or private endeavors. White House on November 22nd.Rear Admiral Grace Hopper, known as "Amazing Grace" and "the first lady of software," was at the forefront of computers and programming development from the 1940s through the 1980s. Hopper's work helped make coding languages more practical and accessible, and she created the first compiler, which translates source code from one language into another. She taught mathematics as an associate professor at Vassar College before joining the United States Naval Reserve as a lieutenant (junior grade) during World War II, where she became one of the first programmers of the Harvard Mark I computer and began her lifelong leadership role in the field of computer science.
