



### COMMISSIONING

The Coast Guard commissioned into service the latest fast response cutter (FRC), the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Donald Horsley (WPC-1117), during a ceremony at U.S. Coast Guard Sector San Juan on May 20. The Donald Horsley is the 17th FRC in the Coast Guard fleet and the fifth to be homeported in San Juan, Puerto Rico. The FRC's belong to the Sentinel-class of cutters named after an enlisted Coast Guard hero who distinguished him or herself in the line of duty. This cutter is named after Master Chief Boatswain's Mate Donald Robert Horsley, who served on active duty for over 44 years. Throughout his career, BMCM Horsley demonstrated exceptional skill and leadership while serving aboard 34 vessels and numerous shore units. His lengthy career spanned three wars and it was during World War II, that he served aboard the USS Cepheus (AKA-18) as a coxswain on landing craft and participated in OPERATION DRAGOON (the invasion of southern France) in the European Theater and OPERA-TION ICEBERG (the invasion of Okinawa) in the Pacific Asian Theater. During the Vietnam War, BMCM Horsley was the senior petty officer assigned to Division 13, Coast Guard Squadron One, serving two tours for a total of 41 months. The Division of 82-foot patrol boats was tasked with the maritime interdiction of the reinforcement and re-supply vessels for Communist forces fighting in South Vietnam. It was during this assignment that BMCM Horsley earned the Bronze Star with a Combat "V", in part due to his having participated in over one hundred combat patrols while coming under intensive enemy fire on eleven separate occasions. The 154-foot long Donald Horsley has a beam of 25 feet and a maximum sustained speed of more than 28 knots. It is armed with a stabilized 25mm machine-gun mount and four crew-served .50caliber machine guns and is equipped with a highly capable small boat and advanced communications suite.



### CONGRESSIONAL NEWS

Congresswoman Lois Frankel (FL-22) visited Jordan, Iraq, and Tunisia to engage with key diplomatic and military leaders spearheading the fight against ISIL. Frankel traveled to these countries to better inform her work on the House Foreign Affairs Committee and Middle East and North Africa Subcommittee. She met with US troops from Florida at King Abdullah II Special Operations Training Center in Amman Jordan.

### US POSTAL SERVICE

The United States Postal Service issued four new stamps to honor those who have received one of the four Service Cross medals. The Distinguished Service Cross, the Navy Cross, the Air Force Cross and the Coast Guard Cross stamps were dedicated on Memorial Day at the World Stamp Show in New York City, which is held once every 10 years. "It's difficult to do something that can actually pay tribute to the individuals themselves because there are so many," said Bill Gicker, creative director of stamp development at the Postal Service. "The thought was to honor them by issuing the stamps of the medals so that it represents them all as a whole." The dedication ceremony at the World Stamp Show included a Color Guard presentation and speeches by various dignitaries — the show coincides with New York's annual Fleet Week.



### SEA SERVICE NEWS



Flight operations is an essential piece of the Navy's mission of maintaining freedom of the seas, deterring aggression and having a capable warfighting force. The Navy's key assets for aviation requirements are air-

craft carriers and amphibious assault ships. As an amphibious assault ship optimized for Marine aviation, USS America (LHA 6) departed its homeport of San Diego May 16 and set out to sea with a clear purpose. The ship's main objective was to recertify the flight deck for launching and recovering aircraft and fulfilling the ship's future role as part of Amphibious Squadron 3 and Expeditionary Strike Group 3. Just short of 36 hours after going to sea, the flight deck was recertified -- having logged more than 24 total hours of flight quarters and more than 90 launches and recoveries of aircraft assigned to Marine Attack Squadron (VMA) 311, Helicopter Sea Combat Squadron (HSC) 23 and Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron (VMM) 163.



Members of Coast Guard Station St. Petersburg participated in the International Special Forces Week 2016 capabilities demonstration in Tampa on May 25. The Station St. Petersburg crew, aboard a

45-foot Response Boat-Medium, served as the "enemy vessel" for the demonstration. As the "enemy vessel", the crew performed a threatening maneuver against a "victim vessel" while the responders suppressed them with defensive maneuvers and by firing simulated rounds. Additional Coast Guardsmen piloted small combat rubber raiding craft, used to retrieve paratroopers toward the end of the event. During the demonstration, special operations forces from various U.S. military branches joined with special operations forces from 15 different partner nations to conduct various rescue and assault scenarios on land and in the bay. The event highlighted unique skills, equipment, training, and personnel involved in special forces operations. This demonstration was part of the Special Operations Forces Industry Conference in Tampa.

Eager Lion 2016. The MSRT is a highly specialized resource with advanced counterterrorism skills and tactics trained to be a first responder to potential terrorist situations; deny terrorist acts; perform security actions against non-compliant actors; perform tactical facility entry and enforcement; participate in port level counterterrorism exercises; and educate other forces on Coast Guard counterterrorism procedures. Exercise Eager Lion is a recurring, exercise designed to strengthen military-to-military relationships and enhance regional security and stability by responding to modern-day security scenarios.



COMPTUEX is the culminating event of the 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit's (MEU's) predeployment training program (PTP), a rigorous cycle of train-

ing courses and unit-level exercises designed to prepare and certify the MEU for the mission essential tasks it may be called upon to perform during its upcoming deployment to the 5th and 6th Fleet areas of responsibility. Whether executing a large scale, multiship, targeted amphibious raid on a simulated enemy position or bringing desperately needed water and relief supplies to notionally starving masses of displaced persons, the key to successful mission accomplishment during the exercise was the tight coordination of the "Blue-Green Team" made up of the 22nd MEU and PHIBRON-6. Now that the team has completed the last major exercise, they move into the final phase of pre-deployment where the 22nd MEU and its subordinate elements, as well as the ships of PHIBRON-6, will ensure their equipment and personnel are mechanically, personally and professionally prepared for the pending deployment. The 22nd Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU) is made up of its Ground Combat Element, Battalion Landing Team, 1st Battalion, 6th Marine Regiment (BLT 1/6); its Aviation Combat Element, Marine Medium Tiltrotor Squadron 264 (Reinforced) (VMM-264); and its Logistics Combat Element, Combat Logistics Battalion 22 (CLB-22). The 22nd MEU will deploy this summer aboard the ships of Amphibious Squadron Six (PHIBRON-6); the USS Wasp (LHD-1), the USS San Antonio (LPD-17), and the USS Whidbey Island (LSD-41).
