


Did you Know?

Legislative Affairs



Advocating on Behalf of the Sea Services

Advocacy is a main pillar of the Navy League's mission. As a nonprofit organization, we are able to mobilize our grassroots membership to get to the heart of the issues that matter to the sea services, both on Capitol Hill and in our local communities.

Breaking News!

The House and Senate have approved the final text for the NDAA. The bill is now on President Biden's desk.

Some of the key provisions include a topline of \$847 billion (\$45 billion above the President's request) and a 4.6% pay raise for servicemembers. Additionally, the following items will be of interest to Navy Leaguers

Surface Warfare

- Authorizes multiyear or block buy contracts for the procurement of up to 25 ship-to-shore connectors, 15 Arleigh Burke-class destroyers, eight Lewisclass oilers, five amphibious ships and CH-53K helicopters.
- Authorizes \$32.6 billion for Navy shipbuilding, an increase of \$4.7 billion, which includes the procurement of 11 battle force ships: three Arleigh Burke-class destroyers; two Virginia-class submarines; two expeditionary fast transports; one Constellation-class frigate; one San Antonio-class amphibious ship; one John Lewis class oiler; and one Navajo-class towing, salvage and rescue ship.
- Authorizes an additional \$2.2 billion for a third Arleigh Burke-class destroyer.
- Authorizes an additional \$289 million for LHA-10 advance procurement.
- Authorizes an additional \$250 million for LPD-33 advance procurement.
- Authorizes an additional \$250 million for surface combatant supplier development.
- Requires certain FFG-62 class vessels to be capable of carrying and employing Tomahawk and Standard Missile-6 missiles.

- Authorizes an additional \$25 million for continued research on the sea-launched cruise missile (SLCM -N).
- Prescribes DDG(X) acquisition elements in the areas of government and industry collaboration, competitive incentives, early technology maturation, and workforce stability.
- Mandates the inclusion of a Navy shipbuilding workforce development special incentive in Navy shipbuilding new construction contracts.
- Prohibits the early retirement of 12 vessels in fiscal year 2023, including: five littoral combat ships, four dock landing ships, two expeditionary transfer docks, and one cruiser.
- Authorizes an increase of \$405.5 million for urgent enhancement of naval mining and delivery capabilities.

Undersea Warfare

- Authorizes full funding of the budget request for Columbia-class submarines.
- Authorizes full funding of the budget request for two Virginia-class submarines.
- Authorizes an increase of \$188.9 million for advanced undersea capability investments.
- Requires a briefing on existing requirements and capabilities for offensive and defensive mining, as well as potential capability and production capacity improvements.

Veterans Day

Navy picks location for new national museum

The Navy has selected a location for its new national museum, Secretary of the Navy Carlos Del Toro said during a recent ceremony celebrating the service's 247th birthday.

The new structure will be positioned just outside the gated Washington Navy Yard in D.C. — where the existing museum can be found — a move designed to allow greater access to the public.

"The exhibits of this new museum will create a living memorial to the U.S. Navy's heritage of victory and valor, bringing to life the human experiences of serving at sea," Del Toro said at the event.



Although replacing the existing museum has been a drawn-out endeavor, the Navy is finally a step closer to constructing an institution it says will better showcase its history and culture.

At an anticipated 240,000 square feet, the new — and free to enter — museum will be over twice the size of the existing space. It is expected to attract roughly 1.5 million visitors per year — its current annual crowd averages roughly 100,000 — putting it on par with the number of guests the area's Smithsonian museums welcome each year.

The announcement is a welcome one, especially given widely shared opinions that the current museum "is not meeting the mission of telling the Navy's story to the American public," according to retired Adm. Samuel Cox, the director of Naval History and Heritage Command and curator of the Navy.

"The base is very hard to get into due to security requirements that have only gotten more stringent over the years," Cox told Military Times. "So, we are not going to have the Navy the nation needs if we don't have the support of Congress, and you won't have the support of Congress if you don't have the support of the American people."



Veterans Day

Parkland, Fl

Our own Council Vice President Commander Tom Melville gave a Veterans Day speech on November 11 at the Parkland Veterans Day celebration.

Here are excerpts from that speech.



Good morning, Ladies, and Gentlemen. Good morning, veterans. Will all Veterans please raise your hand. That includes Veterans of the U.S Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard, Air Force, and the newly created Space Force. Yesterday, November 10, was the Marine Corps birthday.

Happy Veterans Day. What is a Veteran? I'll answer that question.

A Veteran – whether active duty, discharged, retired or reserve – is someone who, at one point in his or her life, wrote a blank check made payable to "The United States of America, for an amount of "up to and including his or her life.

Here's another question, and I'll answer it also. Why do we always celebrate Veterans Day on November 11th at 11:00 AM? Right now, it is the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of this year. The answer is Veterans Day was first called Armistice Day because WW1 fighting ceased on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month of 1918. The Treaty to officially end WW1 was signed 7 months later at Versailles, France. Today is a celebration to honor America/s Veterans for their patriotism, love of country and willingness to serve and sacrifice.

One of the missions of our Armed Services is HUMANI-TARIAN Relief and Assistance. Veterans in All of our Services promote peace, stability, and friendship. Some of the Humanitarian aid is here at home – such as our Coast Guard and National Guard help after Hurricane Ian.

One of the largest humanitarian missions in U.S Military History was Operations Tamadachi in Japan. Three Earthquakes and a Tsunami in 2011 caused 20,000 fatalities. Still, thousands were saved. Marine Veterans cleared tons of debris from 5 runways to reopen the airport at Sendai, Japan. The Navy sent the aircraft carrier USS Ronald Regan and 21 other ships to ferry supplies and to search the ocean for survivors swept into the sea.

Veterans also helped with relief efforts in Pakistan, Haiti, and Indonesia when they were hit by earthquakes, floods, and hurricanes. In Haiti Air Force veterans controlled a huge amount of air traffic after a massive earthquake hit Haiti. The USNS Comfort Hospital Ship provided medical care, fresh water, and shelter. The Navy Hospital Ship Mercy gave the same aid to Indonesians.

The Comfort and Mercy Hospital Ships each have twelve hundred Navy medical and communications veterans serving aboard these two hospital ships. Since 2001 veterans aboard these have conducted humanitarian assistance and disaster response missions at home and abroad, providing care to more than 550,000 people. The Comfort is home ported in Norfolk, VA and the Mercy in San Diego, CA. Veterans aboard the Comfort have provided relief for Puerto Rico in the wake of recent Hurricanes. During COVID-19 both hospital ships deployed with Veterans to New York city and Los Angeles to ease the patient load of those cities during the COVID-19 pandemic.

In conclusion Veterans, you have done your duty to your families, to your communities, to your fallen comrades, and to your country. You have honorable served our country with great distinction and for your service in war and peace.

Member's corner

Memories 12/7/1941

My father Louis Schmidt was a young army enlisted who was on a date with my future mother Jennie D'Alba. They were attending a movie in Washington, D.C. when suddenly the screen went blank and the lights came on. The manager appeared on stage and announced that all military personnel were to report immediately to their duty stations. No further information was given. Jennie was a clerk typist for the Navy Department. The next morning she was one of many typing the terrible reports of our losses at Pearl Harbor.

Eventually Louis was part of our Army forces retaking New Guinea and the Philippine Islands. In the Philippines, our forces were assisted by the Aeta who were among the aboriginal people of the islands. They helped provide perimeter defense using bolo knives, blowguns and bows and arrows. In return, Gen MacArthur promised them medical care in perpetuity and rights to any materials we left at our landfill at Clarke, AFB.

In 1972, I was a general medical officer in the USAF serving in the Pacific. On a visit to Clarke, AFB, I met members of the Aeta and indeed there were a few who were patients in the hospital. We had kept our promise to these remarkable people. During the Viet Nam War, some members of the tribe were instructing our pilots in jungle survival.

These are just a few of our family's memories from those years past.
